### **Course Description**

### **Course Learning Outcomes**

Upon completion of this course, students should be able to:

- 1. List the key pieces of legislation that have set out how First Nations lands are governed in Canada.
- 2. Describe different land management programs administered by the federal government.
- 3. Summarize key provisions under the *Indian Act*.
- 4. Identify how the *Indian Act* assists or hinders First Nations.
- 5. Outline alternatives to the *Indian Act* land tenure system.
- 6. Compare the *First Nations Land Management Act* (FNLMA) with *Indian Act* land tenure provisions.
- 7. Identify recent legislative changes that provide more flexibility and control over First Nations land management.

#### **Course Overview**

The vast majority of Canadians have little to no understanding of First Nation and/or Aboriginal lands and how these lands are managed, protected and governed. This course will provide an introduction to key concepts of First Nations land management and tenure by examining the history of First Nations land tenure in Canada, Federal Government programs, sectoral legislation, and some of the key issues that fall within First Nations land management today.

Each of the 4 modules that comprise this 1-credit course will feature a Self-Test, an asynchronous and interactive class Discussion board, and a graded Module Quiz, with the

course culminating in an online Final Exam. This course is offered by the College of Agriculture & Bioresources for Professional Development in Land Management.

#### Your Instructor

Deanne Kasokeo completed a BA in English at the University of Saskatchewan in 2002 and LL.B at the University of Saskatchewan in 2006. Deanne was called to the Saskatchewan bar in February 2009. Deanne currently runs her own law practice and does primarily criminal law and working with First Nations bands in developing policies. She has also worked on negotiating residential school claims under the IAP settlement agreement negotiating compensation with the federal government on behalf of residential school survivors. Deanne comes from the Poundmaker Cree Nation in Treaty 6 territory.
